Rialto Racquet and Fitness Center

Fitness Center Memberships

From September 28th to October 25th we would like to welcome five new members and nine trial members to the City of Rialto's Fitness & Aquatic Center. We are currently offering a Joining Fee Special for the holiday season - "Toys and Food for Tots." We have been partnering with Rialto Police Department and their Hearts to Share Program.

Vibe Fitness

Our 5:30 a.m., 6:00 p.m., and 7:15 p.m., training sessions grew in attendance and are now popular training times for members and potential new members. The push in November will be to increase attendance in the 8:30 a.m. training session through the Vibe Fitness promotion that will be launched in the beginning of November. November promotion - 6 week strength & conditioning program for \$199 (processed in 3 payments). Rialto employees can claim this promotion for \$169.

Swim Lessons

Private swim lesson enrollment has been steady. We credit this success to our instructors who do a great job with paying attention to detail. They target each swimmer's areas that need improvement and enhance their strengths. The students are progressing to the next level. We look forward to continued growth in this area and will look at private lesson scheduling throughout the operating hours of the pool.

Recreation/Lap Swim

We had 296 swimmers participate in our recreation and lap swim this month. We hope to encourage participation in the recreation swim time and are exploring options to offer one free recreation pass to swim lesson participants during this time. This will boost attendance and encourage parents to bring their children for more practice. With any sport, the more practice one does, the more improvement they will notice.

Rialto Sea Turtles Swim Club

Sea Turtles Swim Club has increased enrollment from 14 to 19 swimmers. Registration is \$52 a month. The swim club prepares novice swimmers, and swimmers who have been taking swim lessons to their limit and are looking for something more. Coach Varonica is there to train those for the sport of competitive swimming.



Staff cross-markets the swim club to intermediate and to advanced level swimmers. Swim tests must be passed in order to join the team.

KidStuff

Our enrollment numbers for all three sites continue to increase. We thank all of the staff dedicated to making sure our KidStuff program progresses for the benefit of the community. As KidStuff continues to grow, we must keep up and make any necessary improvements.

At Tiny Tots Community Center, decisions to renovate the classrooms were necessary in order to expand the number of children we can accommodate. Soon we will have two well-prepared classrooms for our Tiny Tots program.

We are excited to announce that both our Tiny Tots and Preschool programs are closer to incorporating modern technology into the curriculum. This year we were able to order tablets for all three KidStuff sites. Our next step is to ensure WiFi connection at all three sites so that tablets may be used on a regular basis.

Youth Basketball (Divisions 2-4)

The Fall Season of Youth Basketball began on Saturday, October 3rd. Our division 4 summer champions, the Runners, coached by a seasoned volunteer, has returned to defend their crown. This season looks to be very competitive. Normally, this season has a traditional decline in numbers due to football, but the program is thriving with about 200 kids signed up and teams filled!

Girls Volleyball

The fall season of volleyball began on October 2nd. This season has been very competitive in both divisions. We have 3 teams in each division, which allows for double header match-ups, each week. The School District season has claimed a few of our regular participants of the program, however, they still return to cheer their past and future teammates. We applaud all coaches for continuing to help this program flourish.

Little Tots Variety Sports

Our Little Tots Variety Sports program ended on Oct 31st. We had about 12 participants for the variety sports, which will lead right into our Little Tots Flag Football which will begin on November 7th, 2015. The participants enjoyed themselves as was evident in their smiles and cheers.

Adult Basketball

Adult basketball will return on Valentines weekend with the Chaffey Panthers returning as the reigning champions. Our Adult league will be placed on hold for this fall season, only to retool and come back that much stronger in the spring.

Rialto Senior Center


Development Services Department

Airport Redevelopment Update

- **Demolition/Remediation.** On November 2, West Tech Contracting will commence demolition and remediation work, removing the asphalt and concrete and conducting any required soil remediation on the Airport Property.
- **Public Improvements.** The Miro Way Improvements progress rapidly with an expected November, 2015 completion date. The Locust Avenue improvements also progress, although the opening will be delayed until SCE relocates its poles located within the right-of-way near Renaissance Parkway.

LHR will commence construction of the storm drain in Alder Avenue during November, requiring closure of Alder Avenue for approximately 2 weeks. Traffic control plans are being developed to reroute traffic north on Tamarind Avenue, east on Walnut Avenue, and northerly on Laurel Avenue. LHR proceeds quickly to complete street improvements on Walnut Avenue and Laurel Avenue to facilitate the detour.

- **Renaissance Marketplace Update.** On October 22nd, the Lewis-Hillwood Rialto team updated the Economic Development Committee regarding leasing activity at the proposed 600,000 square foot Renaissance Marketplace project. The team reported that it was negotiating “letters of intent” from primary cinemas and soft good retailers, with the goal of achieving a critical mass of committed tenants by January, 2016. With executed letters of intent in hand, LHR will then proceed to lease documentation and commence construction during the third quarter of 2016.
- **Medline and Niagara.** Both projects move quickly toward completion, with Niagara scheduled to complete construction and commence operations by December 1st. Staff met with Niagara and SCE to facilitate the powering up of the Phase I bottling operations using existing infrastructure. Staff also met with Niagara and SCE to discuss the Phase II power requirements. Medline completed foundation work and commenced wall and roof erection, advancing toward a March, 2016 completion date.



The Niagara (foreground) and Medline (background) buildings advance rapidly toward completion during the month of October.


Industrial Project Report

- **City Council Approves DA for I-210 III Logistics Project.** On October 13, 2015, the City Council approved a Development Agreement with Panattoni Development Company for the development of a 743,000 square foot distribution center on 32 acres located at the northeast corner of Baseline Road and Alder Avenue. The developer assembled 22 parcels from multiple ownerships to help alleviate significant blight at this major intersection.

The Development Agreement requires the developer to widen Baseline Road, Alder Avenue, and Laurel Avenue, modify the traffic signal at Alder Avenue and Baseline

Road, and construct a traffic signal at Baseline Road and Laurel Avenue. The developer will also relocate and reconstruct the Friendship Baptist Church currently located on Alder Avenue to its new facility on Baseline Road. The developer will pay \$3.4 million in one-time capital facility fees, and produce annual returns to the City General Fund of \$200,000.

- Amazon Leases Warehouse in Rialto.** Last month, the City reported that Amazon leased the 882,320 square foot distribution warehouse located at 2450-2496 E. Walnut Ave. Amazon applied for and received its business license but has not yet submitted for planning and building permits. Typically, Amazon warehouses produce approximately 1,000 jobs, with significant holiday hiring spikes. Amazon warehouses generate substantial retail sales taxes that by agreement with the State are allocated to the County pool and distributed to all taxing entities within San Bernardino County.
- Drive Medical Makes Rialto its New Home.** Drive Medical, one of the fastest growing global distributors of durable medical equipment, will move its western regional distribution center from Ontario to Rialto. Drive Medical will occupy a new 259,000 square foot warehouse that is nearing construction at the northwest corner of Lilac Avenue and Merrill Avenue. The company markets and distributes medical equipment, including mobility products, beds, bariatric products, wheelchairs, sleep surfaces and pressure prevention products, respiratory equipment, self-assist products, power wheelchairs, power scooters, rehabilitation products, pediatric products, patient room equipment, personal care products and electrotherapy devices. Drive Medical sells and distributes its product to home healthcare providers, healthcare distributors, retailers (both independent and chains), and e-tailers. The City expects a point of sale from this business-to-business retailer.
- Voit Real Estate Forecasts Continuing Demand for New Warehouses.** The demand for new industrial buildings continues unabated according to the Third Quarter, 2015 Inland Empire Industrial Report prepared by Voit Real Estate Services. Net absorption of industrial space increased and vacancy rates declined, with lease rates and sales prices continuing to climb. The vacancy rate for the Inland Empire is 4.9%, a decrease from 9.7% one year ago. Lease rates have bumped up to \$0.46 per square foot, up from \$0.43 on year ago. Voit forecasts continued job creation in the transportation, logistics and distribution sectors that will create demand for new facilities.



Retail Report

- **Wal-Mart Breaks Ground on Rialto Marketplace.** After more than 10 years of planning, the new Wal-Mart Supercenter begins construction this month. On October 22, 2015, the Mayor and City Council joined the development team of Newmark Merrill Companies and Pacific Retail Partners to celebrate the commencement of construction. The Rialto Marketplace is a 230,000 square foot shopping center located at the southwest corner of Riverside Avenue and San Bernardino Avenue.

The 189,000 square foot Wal-Mart Supercenter will anchor the center with nearly 40,000 square feet of ancillary retail space, including a **Les Schwab Tire Store, Carl's Jr., Chipotle, Jersey Mikes, Hawaiian Ono, Menchie's Yogurt, GNC and Pieology**. The partnership of Newmark Merrill Companies and Pacific Retail Partners will develop and lease the retail and restaurant spaces.

- **New Retail Opportunities Analysis.** Periodically, the Rialto examines the annual reports produced by the State Board of Equalization to determine the volume and character of its "leakage" of sales activity to other communities. In retail parlance, a "leakage" of sales means that consumers are satisfying the need for goods with purchasers elsewhere, usually because local opportunities are lacking. This suggests that some or all of this fleeting demand could be served with construction of new stores.

One simplified leakage analysis compares the per capita sales in Rialto for various merchandise lines versus a broader area such as the County of San Bernardino

(adjusted for differences in per capita income). The table below compares Rialto against San Bernardino County for the 2013 calendar year, and shows Rialto's capture rate for various product categories. Capture rates less than 100% indicate leakages. Taking into account competitive locational factors and sector trends, the strongest future opportunities in Rialto are general merchandise, apparel, and restaurants. The City hopes to capture much of this demand in retail centers such as the Rialto Marketplace, Renaissance Marketplace, and the Pepper Avenue Specific Plan area. While the low capture rate for home furnishings/appliances and auto sales suggest an opportunity, these retailers tend to locate in regional centers (like Ontario or San Bernardino) rather than mid-level communities.

Planning Commission Summary

The Planning Commission took action on the following projects:

- **Tentative Tract Map No. 19916.** The Planning Commission approved a request to allow a 22 lot residential subdivision of 5.4 gross acres of land located on the south side of Casmalia Street between Ayala Drive and Spruce Avenue within the Freeway Incubator zone of the Renaissance Specific Plan.
- **Specific Plan Amendment No. 2 to the Renaissance Specific Plan.** The Planning Commission approved a request to change the zoning designation of approximately 4.86 gross acres of land located at the southwest corner of Casmalia Street and Spruce Avenue from Freeway Incubator to Low Density Residential in conjunction with Tentative Tract Map No. 19916.
- **Modification of Conditional Development Permit No. 714.** The Planning Commission approved a request to extend operating hours as conditioned in the conditions of approval for Planning Commission Resolution No. 14-09 in conjunction with live entertainment at Culichi Town restaurant located at 611 E. Foothill Boulevard within the Commercial Pedestrian zone of the Foothill Boulevard Specific Plan.
- **Laurel Avenue Street Vacation.** The Planning Commission approved a Resolution Making Certain Findings and Recommending the Vacation of a Portion of Existing Right-of-Way for Laurel Avenue lying northerly of Baseline in the Employment Zone of the Renaissance Specific Plan.
- **Conditional Development Permit No. 776.** The Planning Commission approved a request to allow an increase in occupancy from 6 to 8 occupants at an existing residential care facility located at 1840 North Magnolia Avenue within the Single Family Residential zone.

- **Conditional Development Permit No. 789.** The Planning Commission approved a request to allow the establishment of a tattoo shop within an existing 480 square foot commercial unit located at 420 S. Riverside Avenue, Suite 10, within the Support Commercial zone of the Central Area Specific Plan.

During the month of October 2015 the Planning Division reviewed development requests as follows:

- **213 W Valley Boulevard.** Staff conducted a due diligence meeting to establish used auto sales at this location. The applicant was informed that a Conditional Development permit is required and was directed to revise the proposed site plan to identify the required off-street parking, indicate display parking, and maintain adequate circulation for the proposed use in conjunction with the existing truck repair business.
- **Mosa Investment Group.** Construction of 2 single family residences at the northwest corner of Bloomington Avenue and Benjamin Street on 2 existing parcels. A Precise Plan of Design will be submitted to the Planning Division pending confirmation of lot line adjustment, required dedication, and location of street improvements.
- **National CORE/Related.** Review site plans for development of Transient Oriented Housing Development up to 30 du/acre on vacant property south of the Metro Link station on Bonnie View.
- **Wal-Mart.** Met regarding Master Sign Plan and development items pertaining to development of the Supercenter and the outparcels.
- **Renaissance Specific Plan Revision.** Meeting to discuss critical path for entitlement processing.
- **Sycamore Avenue north of Randall Avenue.** Met with property owner, architect and engineer regarding a mixed-use senior condominium project.
- **Industrial Project.** Conducted due diligence meeting for a one million square foot industrial building north of Miro Way between Locust Avenue and Linden Avenue within the Renaissance Specific Plan.
- **Soya Trucking Inc.** Development of a truck parking yard on 4.7 acres of land located at the SEC of Locust Avenue and Lowell Street.

Building Division Services

During the month of October, 2015 the Building Division provided the following services:

- **Counter.** Building Division staff provided 292 counter assists, 5 were over the counter reviews (typically, small room additions, patio enclosures, etc.).
- **Plancheck Submittals.** Customers submitted 103 plans for review, 19 of those were completed in-house and 84 were referred to Willdan for plancheck.
- **Plancheck Approvals.** The Building Division approved 68 plans for permit issuance, primarily for solar installations and tenant improvement projects. The average review period for first plan check was 8.4 business days.
- **Building Permits Issued.** The Building Division issued 208 building permits. Plancheck and Permit receipts totaled \$139,981 for the month, with total receipts of \$843,641 for the first four months of FY 16. Last year at this time, total receipts were \$669,195 with growth in receipts of 26% year over year.
- **Development Impact Fees Collected.** The Building Division collected \$1,201,180 in development impact fees. Total development impact fee receipts for FY 16 are \$4,788,266 compared to \$1,544,997 during the same period during FY15. Alere Development paid development impact fees for its 301,000 square foot industrial facility on Riverside Avenue and Jurupa Avenue.

- **Building Inspections.** The City's building inspectors performed 610 inspections, with 395 stops, or 32 inspections per working day along with 21 stops a day.
- **Final Certificates of Occupancy.** The Building Division issued final certificates of occupancy for a total of 25 projects, primarily for business license clearance purposes.

Code Enforcement Services

The Code Enforcement Division acknowledges George Apker, our Code Enforcement Volunteer. Since January 2015, he has abated a total of 7,925 nuisance signs throughout the City's main corridors and residential streets saving countless hours and City monies.

During the month of October, 2015 the Code Enforcement Division provided the following services to the community:

- **New Complaints Registered.** Code Enforcement received 64 new complaints, while processing 51 phone calls and 47 counter inquiries. The majority of these complaints relate to residential properties followed by commercial and some industrial. When a complaint is received, City staff logs the information into InCode (our code enforcement software) and assigns the appropriate Code Enforcement Officer to investigate. Code Enforcement staff respond immediately on emergency complaints, and within 1-2 days for non-emergency complaints.
- **Notices of Violation Issued.** Code Enforcement officers completed 109 residential inspections and issued 115 notices of violation to help educate residents and businesses on the Rialto Municipal Code. Notices of Violation for non-emergency matters provide the recipient with 15 days to correct the R M C violation. During the specified correction period, Code Enforcement Officers re-inspect the residence or business and either deem the case resolved, or move into further enforcement and methods that are more aggressive.
- **Administrative Citations Issued.** Code Enforcement Officers issued 4 Administrative Citations and assessed a total \$147,750 in fines, penalties and interest. When the owner fails to comply with a Notice of Violation within the prescribed correction period, the City may abate the nuisance and charge the homeowner. Periodically, the City Council acts to levy these fees by placing a lien on the offending property.
- **Court Filings.** In extreme situations, the City files a criminal action against a code violator. This is a last resort after the Code Officer has exhausted every effort to secure compliance but the owner decides to ignore the problem. A court citation can also be issued to a person who is scavenging in dumpsters continuously or if there is someone living/camping in area not designated for that purpose.
- **Resolved Cases.** Code Enforcement resolved a total of 132 residential and business cases. By educating homeowners and business owners regarding their maintenance responsibilities, we were able to help them improve their properties so that we all have a better city to live and work in.



The goal of Code Enforcement is voluntary compliance. The pictures above show the before and after of a common complaint – inoperable vehicles.

- **Homeless Outreach Proactive Enforcement (HOPE).** Code Enforcement Officer's Chris DeHesa and Steve Jaramillo responded with the Rialto Police and Fire Departments to a mobile home fire located in the 200 block of N. Linden. The mobile home was a total loss and the owners had no insurance. The Code Enforcement Officers referred the family of four to the San Bernardino County Transitional Assistance Department where they received a 10-day emergency hotel voucher. The Officers also contacted the San Bernardino County Sheriffs H.O.P.E. team for a permanent housing solution for the family.

City Adds Energy Efficiency and Water Conservation Financing Options

On October 27th, the City Council approved three new contractors for installing renewable energy, energy efficiency, and water conservation improvements for residential, industrial, and commercial properties. The new firms supplement contractors previously approved under the SANBAG administered Home Energy Renovation Opportunity (HERO) program. The new firms are Counterpoint Entergy, Renew Financial, and Ygrene Energy Fund. These new contractors are engaged by the California Statewide Communities Development Authority and/or the Golden State Finance Authority. The City Council's action allows these firms to undertake work in Rialto, subject to the rules and regulations of the respective authorities.

The improvements are financed and secured by a lien recorded against the property that is repaid with property taxes. Owners must have 10% equity in their property and be current on mortgage and property taxes. There is no minimum FICO score or income restriction. Since 2012, 866 HERO projects have been completed and \$15 million expended in Rialto, mostly for residential rooftop solar. City Purchases Land Management Software System called TRAKiT

On October 13th, the City Council approved a service contract with SunGard Public Sector Inc. to purchase a software system called TRAKiT. The TRAKiT system replaces two obsolete software systems that manage the permitting services for the Building Division, Planning Division, Code Enforcement Division, Business License Division, and Engineering Division. TRAKiT integrates all development service related divisions

under one land management system; generates activity reports for staff and the public to review; provides field staff with electronic data review and input; and allows the public to electronically submit permit and license applications and review application or inspection status. Staff anticipates the new system to go live in September 2016.


Police Department Memorial Run 2016




The RFD also wants to thank our many sponsors in the community, who collectively gave over \$8,000 to make this event a success. These sponsorships help make our community safer!

New Paramedics and EMT Staff Rialto Ambulances

The field of emergency services is always evolving with new opportunities to better serve our communities. The RFD is committed to be a leader in this evolution by embracing innovative ways to deliver our services. After over a year of planning and organizing, the RFD is pleased to announce a new staffing and deployment model that will increase the number of emergency resources available to serve the community at a fraction of the cost of traditional delivery models. The RFD recently hired nine new paramedics and EMTs whose focus will be on providing medical care through our ambulance transport services. Each of these employees are state licensed paramedics and certified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) just as our current firefighter/paramedics are. This helps us ensure that we have enough emergency resources to meet the demands for medical service while keeping firefighting resources available for fires, rescue, and first response to medical calls.

The newly hired group of paramedics and EMTs bring with them a great deal of experience and skill. Additionally, this career path opens up new opportunities for our Fire Explorers and other community members to attain full-time employment as an EMT while they work towards completing paramedic training, Fire Academy, and other college education opportunities. Eventually, this opens opportunities to be hired as a full-time firefighter/paramedic with the RFD or other fire/EMS organizations.




Introducing these new positions also allowed for a reconfiguration of firefighter staffing levels. By reducing a number of budgeted firefighter positions, there is enough savings to actually add additional fire and EMS units without increased costs. These adjustments in staffing were made possible through the cooperation of City leaders and the firefighters labor association, who worked together on this project to improve service delivery to our community.

Fire Safety at Thanksgiving

Thanksgiving is a great time to gather with friends and family and enjoy good times and wonderful foods. With Turkey being a Thanksgiving tradition, deep frying this dish has become common. While this method may sound delicious, the RFD joins the National Fire Protection Association and the U.S. Fire Administration in discouraging this cooking method. The use of Turkey friars can lead to devastating burns and the destruction of property by causing uncontrollable fires. Here are the top 5 dangers of frying a turkey:

1. Turkey fryers can easily tip over, spilling hot cooking oil over a large area.
2. An overfilled cooking pot will cause cooking oil to spill when the turkey is put in, and a partially frozen turkey will cause cooking oil to splatter when put in the pot.
3. Even a small amount of cooking oil spilling on a hot burner can cause a large fire.
4. Without thermostat controls, deep fryers can overheat oil to the point of starting a fire.
5. The sides of the cooking pot, lid and pot handles can get dangerously hot.



This is a combination that can end disastrously. In fact, frying food is the greatest risk of cooking fires according to the U.S. Fire Administration. They also note that more than HALF of cooking fire injuries occur when people try to fight the fire themselves.

If you really want the taste of a deep fried turkey, we recommend that you locate a local specialty food service that may be able to prepare it for you, or consider a new type of “oil-free” turkey fryer that is currently available at major retail stores. The RFD wishes everyone a happy and SAFE Thanksgiving.

CPR and Basic First Aid Training

Don't forget, the Rialto FD is offering CPR and basic first aid training every month. Classes will be held on the third Thursday of each month at Fire Station 203, located at 1550 N. Ayala Drive.

The classes are offered in two sessions. The CPR class is taught by our certified instructors from 8:00 a.m. to 12:00 p.m. Upon successful completion, you receive Basic Life Support CPR certification card from the American Heart Association. The cost of the class is \$50.00 which covers all required manuals, AHA certification costs, and your own one-way pocket mask that is used to deliver breaths when performing CPR.



The basic first aid portion of the training then picks up from 1:00 p.m. to 4:00 p.m. This class uses standardized curriculum to give the student the ability to properly deal with a variety of medical and traumatic events. The cost of this class is \$20.00 which includes the instruction, hands-on training, and student manual.

Public Works

Water Conservation Update

Sacramento – Californians reduced water use by more than 26 percent during September, exceeding Governor Edmund G. Brown Jr.'s 25 percent conservation mandate for a fourth straight month. "Millions of Californians have saved water during the summer months, which are the four most critical months to save water," said Felicia Marcus, chair of the State Water Resources Control Board. "This is important and wonderful, and we are thankful for all of the effort by individuals and agencies. Now, we need to keep it up as best we can, even as we hope for as much rain and snow as we can safely handle. We're in the position of having to prepare for drought and flooding at the same time, but that's what we're faced with."

Nearly all water suppliers in the state have complied with the conservation standards. However, a few have not stepped up in the same way, despite warnings that failure to meet conservation targets could result in penalties. Yesterday, the State Water Resources Control Board (State Water Board) Office of Enforcement issued enforcement actions against four urban water suppliers that have consistently failed to meet their water conservation goals. The suppliers are the city of Beverly Hills, city of Indio, city of Redlands and the Coachella Valley Water District. Each of these suppliers has been issued a complaint for a \$61,000 penalty for failing to meet their mandated conservation tier standards. These penalties are based on the Board's authority to issue fines of \$500 per day for violations of its emergency regulation.

Rialto – The State Water Board has listed City of Rialto and West Valley Water District in the top 10 of urban water suppliers that are not meeting conservation measures.

Just a reminder that the Public Works Department is seeking volunteers to assist in the distribution of water conservation leaflets in the form of a door hanger to all the residents in Rialto.

During the month of November, the site will be open on Friday and Saturday, the 6th and 7th, and Friday and Saturday, the 20th and 21st, from 8:00 a.m. until 12:00 noon.
