





Fitness Center Projects

This holiday season we are happy to announce some improvements that are underway at our facility:

- Swimming Pool Deck Rehab. The deck is being resurfaced throughout the locker rooms, pool deck area and chemical rooms.
- Sauna/Jacuzzi Flooring Rehab. Within the same project our flooring in these areas are also being redone.
- New sauna benches and walls will be replaced during this down time as well.

Fitness Center Memberships



Development Services Department

Airport Redevelopment Update

- **Demolition/Remediation.** West Tech Contracting continues demolition and remediation work, crushing stockpiled materials, removing the asphalt and concrete and conducting any required soil remediation on the Airport Property. The City received a no further action letter from the Regional Water Quality Control Board related to the We Care Charities leased premises, after that former Airport tenant completed a remediation program overseen by the Water Board.

The City engaged Kimley Horn & Associates to conduct field surveys for the burrowing owls that have nested near the construction site. After consultations with representatives from the State Fish & Wildlife Department, the City implemented measures to minimize impacts upon the resident owls. These measures include establishment of buffer zones, ongoing monitoring of owl movements, contractor communication, and development of a plan to enhance burrows removed from the demolition work to serve as interim facilities.

- **Public Improvements.** LHR substantially completed the Miro Way, Locust Avenue, and Walnut/Laurel Improvements during December 2015 adjacent to the Niagara and Medline Projects. LHR commenced street work on the stretch of Miro Way from Linden Avenue to Locust Avenue.

SCE relocated its poles located within the Locust Avenue right-of-way near Renaissance Parkway. One pole remains in the right-of-way pending relocation of a telecommunication line. LHR will then pave the easterly side of Locust Avenue.

LHR commenced construction of the storm drain in Alder Avenue, requiring a full closure of Alder Avenue for approximately 6 weeks into February 2016. Fontana Water Company constructed a new water line in Alder Avenue. Traffic was rerouted north on Tamarind Avenue, east on Walnut Avenue, and northerly on Laurel Avenue.

- **Medline and Niagara.** Niagara expects to complete construction of its facility and commence full operations in January. Medline advances toward a March 2016 completion date.

On December 8, 2015, the City Council approved a Location Agreement with Medline Industries that establishes a point of sale from this location, generating an estimated \$750,000 to \$1,000,000 per year in sales taxes for the City General Fund.

Retail Report

- **Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf.** On November 10, 2015, the City Council approved a purchase and sale agreement with Fountainhead Shrugged for the development of a Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf at the southeast corner of Riverside Avenue and Easton Avenue. Fountainhead completed its due diligence review of the site, and approved title subject to the City's release of an easement held by the West Valley Water District. Fountainhead will now proceed to submit its Precise Plan of Design application.
- **Wal-Mart.** Wal-Mart commenced rough grading last month, and will commence off-site improvements in January 2016. Weather permitting, the new store will open by August 2016. The City's street improvement work around the Wal-Mart center will also commence in January 2016 with expected completion by April 2016.
- **Easton/Ayala Retail Project.** The City completed an ALTA survey and mapped all of the easements and underground utility systems affecting the site. The City provided the boundary survey information to Fernando Acosta, and he prepared a preliminary site plan. On December 16, 2015, the Economic Development Committee reviewed the site plan and received a leasing update. The City will now appraise the County parcel taking into account all of the encumbrances that affect its utilization and value.

Industrial Project Report

The City remains extremely active in the construction and entitlement of industrial complexes. The table below provides a summary of projects recently completed, under

construction, or in the planning pipeline. If all of the projects develop, the City will realize over 6,000 new jobs and \$1 billion in new assessed valuations.

Planning Commission Summary

The Planning Commission took action on the following projects:

- Modification of Planning Commission Resolution No. 13-31.** The Planning Commission denied a request to remove Condition of Approval No. 36 for Tentative Tract Map No. 17708, which requires compliance with the United States Fish and Wildlife Service requirements relating to the Delhi Sands Flower-Loving Fly prior to the issuance of a grading permit. Tentative Tract Map No. 17708 is a 24 single-family lot subdivision of 4.75 acres of land located on the west side of Acacia Avenue approximately 615 feet south of Merrill Avenue.
- Conditional Development Permit No. 795.** The Planning Commission approved a request to allow the establishment of a 4,000 square foot educational facility within the Rialto Towne Plaza at 150 W. Base Line Road, Unit B. The project site is located within the C-1A Community Shopping Center zone.

What is the 2016 RTP/SCS?

The RTP/SCS represents the vision for Southern California's future, including policies, strategies, and projects for advancing the region's mobility, economy, and sustainability through 2040. The plan details how the region will address its transportation and land

use challenges and opportunities in order to achieve its regional emissions standards and Greenhouse Gas (GHG) reduction targets.

Federal legislation requires preparation of the RTP in order to receive federal funds. State legislation requires preparation of the SCS. SCAG is required to update the RTP/SCS every four years.

How does it affect me? Given the geographic diversity and size of the SCAG region, a coordinated transportation system that is well integrated with land uses and operates efficiently is imperative to the mobility and quality of life of Southern California residents. By employing a regional focus to transportation and land use planning, SCAG seeks to improve the region's mobility, economy, and sustainability.

Moreover, although it does not commit funds to specific projects, the RTP/SCS does set the framework for how transportation tax dollars will be spent in the SCAG region over the coming years and decades. The RTP/SCS goals and policies shape the future of the SCAG region.

Building Division Report

During the month of December 2015, the Building Division provided the following services:

- **Counter Services.** Building Division staff provided 230 counter assists, 5 were over the counter reviews (typically, walls, patios, small room additions, patio enclosures, etc.).
- **Plan Check Submittals.** Customers submitted 58 plans for review, 6 of those were completed in-house, and 52 were referred to Willdan for plan check.
- **Plan Check Approvals.** The Building Division approved 57 plans for permit issuance, primarily for solar installations and tenant improvement projects. The average review period for first plan check was 5.2 business days.
- **Building Permits Issued.** The Building Division issued 131 building permits. Plan check and Permit receipts totaled \$90,194.
- **Development Impact Fees Collected.** The Building Division collected \$151,229 in development impact fees. Total development impact fee receipts for FY 16 are \$5,378,039 compared to \$5,018,026 during the same period during FY15.
- **Building Inspections.** The City's building inspectors performed 382 inspections, with 271 stops, or 29 inspections per working day along with 20 stops a day.
- **Final Certificates of Occupancy.** The Building Division issued final certificates of occupancy for 4 projects.

During the month of December 2015, the Code Enforcement Division provided the following services to the community:

- **New Complaints Registered.** The Code Enforcement Division received 44 phone complaints and 21 counter inquiries during the month of December. The majority of these complaints relate to residential properties followed by commercial and some industrial.
- **Notices of Violation Issued.** Code Enforcement officers completed 67 residential inspections and issued 68 notices of violation to help educate residents and businesses on the Rialto Municipal Code.
- **Administrative Citations Issued.** Code Enforcement Officers issued 6 Administrative Citations and assessed a total \$49,500 in fines, penalties, and interest.
- **Court Filings.** The City did not file a judicial action during December.
- **Resolved Cases.** Code Enforcement closed 74 residential and business cases.

Median Home Prices in Rialto Increase 6% Compared to November 2014

Home prices in Rialto continue to increase from the depths of the Great Recession. During November 2015, the median home value in Rialto was \$281,800, a 6% increase from November 2014. The median value for the 92376 zip code was \$264,100 (6% increase) and for the 92377 zip code was \$330,600 (5% increase). Since November 2010 the median home value increased by 11%.

During November 2015, 136 homes were available for sale, compared to 161 homes in November 2014 and 288 homes in November 2010. Since 2012, the inventory of homes for sale each month averaged less than 150 per month. From 2010 through 2012, the average number of homes for sale was over 250 home per month.

State Approves Two Parcel Sales to Fountainhead Shrugged and Wayne Morin

In December 2015, the Oversight Board and the California Department of Finance approved the sale of two separate Successor Agency parcels:

- **Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf.** In November 2015, the City Council approved the sale of a 20,000 square foot parcel at the southeast corner of Riverside Avenue and Easton Avenue to Fountainhead Shrugged LLC. The buyer proposes to develop a Coffee Bean and Tea Leaf drive thru. The sales price is \$480,000.
- **Wayne Morin.** In November 2015, the City Council approved the sale of a 3.24-acre parcel at the southwest corner of Walnut Avenue and Alder Avenue to Wayne Morin. The buyer proposes to consolidate the parcel with 5 adjoining acres and eventually develop an industrial building. The sales price is \$1,693,608.

The sale proceeds will be distributed to various taxing entities as property taxes, and the City will receive about 14% of the proceeds as its share of the property taxes.

A Message from the Chief



I am truly humbled and honored to be the new City of Rialto Police Chief. I am very proud to represent all of the hard working men and women of the Rialto Police Department and the Community we serve.

As we enter 2016, we have a lot to be proud of in terms of crime and public safety. In October of 2015, the Rialto Police Department was awarded the International Chiefs of Police "Excellence in Law Enforcement Research Award" which recognizes law enforcement agencies that demonstrate excellence in conducting and using research to improve police operations and public safety. The award criteria focuses on the uniqueness of research, quality research, leadership, partnerships, and performance monitoring.

We will continue to focus on reshaping the Area Command model of Community-Based Policing. This highly successful program is designed to encourage open communication, enhance community confidence, and streamline the delivery of police services. As we enter 2016 the department will be enhancing the Rialto Re-Entry Support Team with two additional Police Officers. These two additional Police Officers will be a Community Outreach Team who will be working with County Mental Health, the homeless, transient and mentally ill populations within the City. The Community Outreach Team will provide assistance and transitional resources from the City, County and State. The Community Outreach Team will additionally work on Area Command Projects, Nuisance Abatements and Crime Free Multi Housing programs.

We will continue to move forward and look for new innovative projects to include a department radio show, the implementation of a new gang reduction and education program (CAL-GRIP) focusing on our youth, a new program geared towards educating our community members on the importance of keeping our neighborhoods safe by reporting crime, and focusing on school safety and youth interaction by increasing the number of School Resource Officers who are on the campuses and Police Officers who are in the classrooms teaching and interacting with our students.

We will continue to share resources with our neighboring cities (Regionalized SWAT and Air Support Programs), along with pursuing state and federal grants for police safety and emergency equipment, technology projects, school safety, youth accountability and gang reduction programs.

We will continue to utilize technology to share public safety information with our citizens including our department website, Facebook, Nextdoor, Crimemapping.com, Tip411, digital signage, media outreach, public service announcements, and high speed emergency notification systems such as NIXLE.

We will continue to embrace volunteerism and community pride, working to enhance the great programs that we already have in place. But most off all, we will continue to foster the great community relationships we have worked so hard to establish over the past several years.

We will continue to move forward as an organization striving to become the premiere law enforcement agency in the Inland Empire region of Southern California. We understand that the fear of crime can be best reduced through the balanced delivery of policing that consists of four components: prevention, intervention, enforcement, and training. In 2016 the department will enhance the Traffic Division by adding two additional Motor Officers and two additional Traffic Officers. The addition to the Traffic Division will enhance public safety through training, education and enforcement. The Traffic Division will work closely with the Office of Traffic Safety, Rialto Unified School District and MADD (Mothers Against Drunk Driving). Our goal is to reduce traffic accidents, fatalities, and enhance safety in and around school routes. We also recognize that maintaining community safety can only be achieved with the support and involvement of our community.

Preparing, Responding, and Recovering to a National Tragedy

December 2, 2015, was a tragic day for the nation, and for our local communities. In an act described as inspired by terrorists, 14 San Bernardino County employees were killed and 22 were seriously injured in a random attack on innocent victims. In the chaotic hours that followed, first responders from throughout the valley area, including the Rialto Fire Department, responded to the scene. While we share the anger and frustration that this attack brings, we are proud that



we could be there in the time of need to reduce the loss of life and support our local agencies. Firefighter/Paramedics Chad Vogtman and Jake Ploehn responded to the incident in Medic Ambulance 202, and were some of the first to arrive on scene. We are proud of their work, and confident that we were sending some of Rialto's best.



While these types of events are rare, we want the community to know that it is our mission to be prepared for these worst-case scenario events. In June of 2015, the Rialto Police and Fire Departments joined forces to conduct comprehensive training on dealing with incidents just like the one in San Bernardino, referred to as "Active Shooter" incidents.

While we believe that the threat of such an incident is extremely low, we know now more than ever that we are not immune to these types of tragedies. Rialto Police and Fire Departments will continue this type of training, and will be purchasing equipment to increase our efficiency with grant monies acquired through the Department of Homeland Security.

Rialto Fire and Police Departments also started the next steps in any tragedy like this, and that is the healing and recovery process. On December 23rd, the two departments coordinated with Target for a Christmas shopping spree for Rialto residents Colin and Ethan Verdehyou, the sons of Bennetta Betbadal, 46, who was killed in the San Bernardino shooting. The afternoon began at Fire Station 201 as the two boys were met by Rialto PD and Fire members. From there they rode to Target in style in Medic Engine 201, escorted by Rialto PD. Even with all that these young men are going through, it was good to see smiles on their face for one afternoon, as the City of Rialto showed their support for their community members in need.



Fire Department Training

One of the myriad of services that your Rialto Firefighters provide is technical rescue. This involves the rescue of persons trapped in environments that are unsafe using specialized rescue equipment. To maintain this skill set, firefighters participate in regular training activities encompassing the wide spectrum of rescue activities that they may be called on to perform. Recently, your Rialto Firefighters partnered with local industrial property owners to conduct a confined space rescue drill.



Another element of our ongoing training includes giving critical review about our own incidents as well as the incidents that other fire departments around the country respond to. This month, retired Fire Lieutenant John Griffin from the Worcester, MA Fire Department brought a powerful training session to your Rialto Firefighters. Lt. Griffin provided lessons learned from a fire in Worcester in which six firefighters lost their lives. In remembrance of the six fallen firefighters, we were honored to receive this training in hopes that the circumstances that have led to tragedy in the past can be avoided in the future.

Building Relationships with Area Businesses

The Rialto Fire Department had the opportunity to partner with local businesses to conduct training on safety and firefighting operations for large commercial structures. Your Rialto Firefighters conducted drills at the facility on West Walnut that Amazon is developing as a fulfillment center. Partnering with businesses during facility construction and/or redesign allows the Fire Department to train on safe and effective operations specific to the risks and needs of our community.



Preparing for the Storms

We're all aware by now that the weather phenomenon known as "El Nino" is on track to bring Southern California significant rains and the potential for wide-spread flooding. While the City has been preparing for these storms for months, we are also preparing to respond if the rains begin to damage large parts of the City. When significant emergencies like this



occur, the City will activate its Emergency Operations Center (EOC) to coordinate the multiple resources that will be needed to address the emergency and communicate vital information to our community members. The EOC is staffed with members from every City department to coordinate incident operations, planning, logistics, and finance. To ensure that this team functions effectively, we will be training throughout the month of January on specific flood scenarios that could occur during extreme periods of rain. Having a coordinated response like this is key to ensuring that our community is protected through effective preparation, response, and recovery. It also helps ensure that the City will receive any State and Federal funds that may be available to assist in the costs of repairing any damage to public and private property.

Winter Fire Safety: Safe Heating

According to the National Fire Protection Association, space heaters, whether portable or stationary, accounted for one-third (33%) of home heating fires and four out of five (81%) of home heating fire deaths. The leading factor contributing to home heating fires (28%) was failure to keep the heating device clean. ***Half of all home heating fires occurred in December, January and February.***

With the cold weather upon us, Rialto Fire wants to remind everyone that heating units can be used safely, but can also be hazardous. Here are some steps to take to prevent fires caused from heating devices:



- Keep anything that can burn at least three feet away from heating equipment, like the furnace, fireplace, wood stove, or portable space heater.
- Have a three-foot “kid-free zone” around open fires and space heaters.
- Never use your oven to heat your home.
- Have a qualified professional install stationary space heating equipment, water heaters or central heating equipment according to the local codes and manufacturer’s instructions.
- Have heating equipment and chimneys cleaned and inspected every year by a qualified professional.
- Remember to turn portable heaters off when leaving the room or going to bed.
- Always use the right kind of fuel, specified by the manufacturer, for fuel burning space heaters.
- Make sure the fireplace has a sturdy screen to stop sparks from flying into the room. Ashes should be cool before putting them in a metal container. Keep the container a safe distance away from your home.
- Test smoke alarms monthly.

Building Efficiency When it Counts

The Rialto Fire Department is dedicated to increasing survival rates from cardiac arrest through innovative technology and performance excellence. Over the next few months, the RFD will be focusing on advanced resuscitation techniques that increase the speed and efficiency in which we treat patients in full cardiac arrest. This training will focus on a team approach that borrows concepts from “pit crews” in professional racing. This includes maximizing the efficiency of every task and person, moving quickly but efficiently, and improving communication between all team members. This is in addition to the state of the art equipment and techniques already used here at the RFD. Through these efforts, we expect to see positive improvements in our survival rates from cardiac arrest. Improving our survival rate from sudden cardiac arrest to be five-times greater than the national average is one of the Fire Department’s goals in our five-year strategic plan.

Public Works

Water Conservation Update

On December 8, 2015, the Rialto City Council will be considering staff’s recommendation to move to Stage 3-B of the Water Conservation Warning. Under Stage 3-B, residents would be **required to cut back there landscape irrigation from 3 days to 2 days per week**. The other restrictions under Stage 3 still apply which are:

- Reduce water use by 25%.
- Limit all landscape irrigation to **2 days per week** between the hours of 8 pm and 6 am; 10 minutes per station maximum.
- Prevent water waste from runoff, breaks and leaks.
- Sweep hardscapes rather than using a hose.
- Use a recirculating water pump if you have a fountain or water feature.
- Repair leaks within 72 hours of notification.
- Do not fill swimming pools or fountains that have been drained.



Willow, will accept your used motor oil and filters, paint, household cleaners, pesticides, weed killers, batteries, syringes, fluorescent bulbs, medications and other household chemicals. **We cannot accept explosives, medical waste, abandoned waste, or business waste.** *This site is free to all residents of San Bernardino County.*



- **Used Tires** – **Rialto City residents** can bring up to 9 used tires to the Public Works Office at 335 W. Rialto Ave on Community Clean-Up days free of charge. We will not accept tires from businesses, including semi-trucks.



- **Electronic Waste** – Bring your televisions, microwaves, computers and monitors, and other electronics to the south parking lot of City Hall to be recycled. **Businesses are welcome.**
